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DAY ONE ● We set off from our local departure points and head North to our destination with an en route visit to Killiecrankie, site of the battle fought between the Scottish clans supporting King James VII and government troops supporting King William of Orange. A stunning victory for the Jacobites here was later followed by a scattering of their forces in Dunkeld which we shall also visit. This cathedral town is one of Perthshire's many gems, rich in beautifully restored buildings and an inspiration for lovers of art and history thanks to its rich heritage. We arrive at the Angus Hotel in Blairgowrie in time to relax before taking dinner.

DAY TWO • After breakfast we visit Fort George, the 18th century fortress with perhaps the mightiest artillery fortifications in Europe. It was built to pacify the Scottish Highlands in the aftermath of the Jacobite rising of 1745. The fortress has never been attacked and has remained in continuous use as a garrison. The fortification is based on a Star design and remains virtually unaltered. Today its exhibits showing the fort's use at different periods is open to visitors and is still used as army barracks. After lunch we continue to Culloden to visit the site of the final confrontation of the 1745 Jacobite Rising which took place on 16 April 1746. The battle pitted the Jacobite forces of Charles Edward Stuart against William Augustus, Duke of Cumberland, loyal to the British government. The Jacobite cause to overthrow the reigning House of Hanover and restore the House of Stuart to the British throne was dealt a decisive defeat at Culloden and Charles Stuart never mounted any further attempts to challenge Hanoverian power in Britain. The conflict was the last pitched battle fought on British soil. We return to our hotel for dinner.

DAY THREE • After breakfast today we head for the highlight of our tour: a journey on the Jacobite Steam Train. It is regarded as one of the Great Railway Journeys of the World due mainly to the stunning scenery and several extreme sights through which it travels. It starts near the highest mountain in Britain (Ben Nevis), visits Britain's most westerly mainland railway station (Arisaig), then passes close by the deepest seawater loch in Europe: Loch Nevis. We arrive in Maiilag where we will then have time to explore this charming fishing town and for a spot of lunch. We take dinner at our hotel.

DAY FOUR • Today we bid farewell to our hosts and board our coach for a visit to Drumnadrochit en route our homeward journey. Home to the Loch Ness Centre whose five star exhibition is endorsed by Scottish Natural Heritage as a 'portal to the unique phenomenon that is Loch Ness', here the real inner secrets of the lake are revealed, shedding some very unexpected light upon the mystery for which it is so widely known. Drumnadrochit still retains a great deal of charm and personality and just a short distance away is Urquhart Castle, well worth a visit to experience the amazing views and stroll around the ancient ruins to find out more about its turbulent history. We will then proceed for a brief visit to the site of the Battle of Sherrifmuir before resuming our journey back home with drop off at our original departure points.









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
